It's still a long way to go, and we are getting there, despite the challenges faced when one wants to address issues at the core. With ongoing support from local farmers, small entrepreneurs and committed donors, we see our vision - of building a desert-based circular economy coming to life, one step and project at a time. With our dedicated team, partners, donors and community support, we look forward to continuing this journey in the latter part of 2025 and beyond. Thank you for being part of the RuralRevive Initiative, and enjoy our bi-annual update.

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Our cherished and adorable Cargo Donkey's 'Naartjie and Pampoen' - the official 'Mascots' and torch bearers of the 25 January 2025 Maltahöhe Clean-Up Competition - carried load upon load of trash - collected next to the roadside in the Village - to the recycling facility at Maraun's Garage. The real 'Hero of this successful event , resulting in 1250 bags of trash removed from the streets (see page 3) - are some 300+ engaged residents who heeded the call to make Maltahöhe clean again.

This simple solution to collect recyclables from the roadsides in Maltahöhe could well prove to be 'the way' and inspire other villages in Namibia and Africa to follow suit. No need to surrender to the wave of trash.

2030 & Beyond - together we're in it for the long run

Once a thriving agricultural hub powered by the Karakul sheep industry, Maltahöhe faced decades of steady decline - with its buildings weathered, streets forgotten, and its spirit abandoned. And then, three years ago, something began to stir. In January 2022 the RuralRevive Initiative seed - potentially a powerful 'agent of change' - was planted. Today, that seed has grown into a flourishing young tree of hope. EconoMix Feedback session

By January, four cohorts have been taken through the basics of business training, now even aided by video clips which were produced late 2024. With every cohort, valuable lessons are learnt; what works and what doesn't, helping us to tweak the framework which needs continuous updating as we go. The transition from being unemployed and hopeless to becoming a small entrepreneur, and sticking to it, is certainly not without challenges and teething problems.

Maltahöhe Clean-Up 2025

January 25th was a day of unity, energy, and environmental action in Maltahöhe. Close to 300 community members, young and old came together with one shared goal: to clean up our town and reimagine waste as a treasure.

Armed with bags, gloves, and determination, volunteers cleared streets of waste and recyclables, most of which made their way to our new walk-in community waste management facility, where residents can now exchange recyclables for cash. Since its opening in August 2024, this facility has collected nearly 80,000 bottles, making a visible, positive impact on our environment.

Pampoen and Naartjie – two beloved donkeys and our newest "team members", were the highlight of the day. Outfitted with custom recycling bags, they now roam the streets of Maltahöhe, helping to collect recyclables, and importantly transport the waste to Marains. In return for a good days work and numerous trips, they're fed lucern and fresh carrots from our garden - treated with love and given a safe home. In a region where donkeys are often overlooked and abused, they now represent a powerful symbol of care, renewal, and responsibility – for animals and people alike.

And in the background, our trusty Desert Runner zipped across town – delivering bags full of waste and transporting community members across town, keeping the clean-up alive and thriving. The Clean-Up is set to become an annual event - until clean streets devoid of trash - renders the event obsolete. That is the aim, and it can be done.

A lonely man sits and waits for another day, potentially getting an idea how life for the rural community along the route (see right) - comprising lodge staff, farm workers, resettlement farmers and the like can change for the better, thanks to a scheduled and guaranteed bi-weekly transport at affordable rates. It is a start, and reminiscent of the old 'Posbus' (government post bus) doing the rounds in the rural areas.

The DesertRunner Route from Maltahöhe to Wolwedans, going on Mondays and Thursdays (pm) and returning on Tuesdays and Fridays (am), connecting to Windhoek in the afternoon. On Wednesdays the truck will go from Maltahöhe to Mariental for the day (with a five hour lay-over). This scheduled service is available to residents from Maltahöhe to do their errands in town (doctor, bank, shopping) and even transport goods at a given rate per kg.

DesertRunner Logistics

Connecting the dots

DesertRunner - a scheduled transport service connecting Maltahöhe with the lodges in the desert - forms part of the RuralRevive Initiative. It is the wheels which gets things moving and connecting the dots - all the way to Windhoek. DesertRunner is a non-profit venture which allows us to keep rates at cost price. For the pilot phase (July - December 2025) we will be using a Quantum to connect Maltahöhe with Windhoek twice a week, and a UD Hino Truck connecting Maltahöhe with Wolwedans via Hammerstein, Neuhof, Witwater and Geluk Junction twice a week. The DesertRunner is open for the public and all lodges en-route or beyond are encouraged to make use of it. Seats have to be booked in advance on a first come first serve basis. Confirmation will be sent by email, WhatsApp and/or sms.

RuralRevive Winter Cup 2025 - kick off with passion

Organisers, teams and residents look forward to 2026 and it will be exciting to see the tournament grow from strength to strength. Who knows - maybe one day the Cup will evolve into a regional league well beyond Maltahöhe and Daweb.

Project - Klein Kalkheuwel Regenerative Farm

Now neglected, 'Nothing' will organically have been revived into 'Something' here soon. Let's watch this space



Where today, lies a barren piece of land, abandoned and neglected, there will hopefully soon be green fields, life and commercial vegetable production. The first step is to secure the field with a game fence to keep out (remarkably) Kudu and other wild animals who would be all too happy to browse and feed in the garden. As much as we'd like to see fences go down for wildlife to roam free, this fence needs to be there...

During 2025/26 Wolwedans Desert Academy will expand its Horticulture training to Maltahöhe as part of the RuralRevive Project in order to scale the effort. The plan is to conduct all 1st year, Level 2 Training at Maltahöhe as of 2026 and then shift successful Level 3 trainees to a variety of 'small farms' and Wolwedans for job attachment. To this end, and in addition to Wolwedans Desert Academy, a new VTC - called Desert Academy Maltahöhe - will be established over the coming years.

A crop field of one hectare under irrigation is required by the NQA (Namibia Qualifications Authority) for both Desert Academy's to be accredited as VTC's. As such a 'field' can't be established at Wolwedans - located in the NamibRand Nature Reserve - and neither in Maltahöhe, therefore 'Klein Kalkheuwel' was identified as a potential site. The owner of Kalkheuwel - Vincent du Toit - is happy to lease 80 ha of land between the roads - to the Wolwedans Foundation on a five year term.





Kalkheuwel is located on the western 'Floere' some 50 km East of Maltahöhe and strategically positioned on the road from Maltahöhe to NamibRand/Wolwedans and Sossusvlei. It lies on the route of the DesertRunner, a scheduled transport service connecting the desert with Maltahöhe and, as of July 2025, passing through Kalkheuwel twice a week, making connectivity excellent.

The objective is to establish a larger scale garden (1 ha) to feed into "The Barn" trading hub and RuralRevive, and simultaneously be a practical training ground for job attachment for Level 3 Horticulture Trainees from Wolwedans and primarily Maltahöhe. Said garden will help to comply with Horticulture Certification of both Wolwedans Desert Academy and Maltahöhe Desert Academy. Existing buildings will be fixed to accommodate some trainees (main house), a

Die Floere

Apart from the unique "Sandhof Lillies", Daweb holds another little known secret: abundant water reserves underneath the so-called "Floere" west of Maltahöhe. Immense amounts of underground water have been utilised in the past but in the end, it seems markets (central Namibia essentially or the coast) for vegetable and fruit were just too far away. And so it was lucern and later - nothing - bar some subsistence farming. This is about to change as markets open (the lodges) and 'farm to plate' becomes trendy. A second lease on life for the 'Floere'?

The following infrastructure developments will happen over the next 12 months

- Water infrastructure comprising solar driven submersible pumps, water tanks, booster pumps and irrigation infrastructure
- 2. Grey water system, with overflow water utilised to water trees and hedges
- 3. Game fencing around 1 ha crop field, to protect crop from wildlife
- 4. Basic renovation of all buildings to make them fit for accommodating trainees (4-6 at a time) and one facilitator/gardener. As the lease is limited not too much will be added which is nice as the quirky character of Kalkheuwel would be maintained.
- 5. Small solar energy system to power the whole set-up
- 6. Rehabilitation of dump-site and establishment of recycling system and waste management, so all waste is going to Maltahöhe for recycling (85%).

Open Market

Whilst not yet the big buzz initiators and vendors would like to see, the Open Market is there to stay. Ultimately - once 'The Barn' has moved to the old PEP stores - it will organically evolve into a weekly trading hub. For the remainder of 2025 it is a monthly affair, open to anybody who has vegetables, fruit, value add products and handicraft items to sell. Visitors from Windhoek never miss the opportunity to take some goodies home with them.







RR inspiring a new way

Exploratory Field Visit for Tourism Development Assessment

Late June we received a visit by a delegation comprising representatives from some NGO's and government. The aim was to find inspiration and ideas both in Maltahöhe and Wolwedans for the 'Namibia for Life Project - Finance for Permanence' Programme.

The Namibia for Life initiative is a long-term conservation finance mechanism being developed under the Project Finance for Permanence model, with leadership from WWF and national partners including NACSO and the Ministry of Environment, Forestry and Tourism. Its goal is to secure permanent financial sustainability for Namibia's Community-Based Natural Resource Management (CBNRM) Program, which are critical to both biodiversity conservation and the livelihoods of rural communities. The PFP model brings together upfront capital commitments from public and private funders and ties disbursement to achieving clearly defined milestones. In Namibia, the focus is on securing long-term funding for 86 registered conservancies covering over 20% of the country's land area. Namibia for Life aims to become a flagship African conservation finance platform, supporting both ecological resilience and inclusive economic development.

The purpose of the exploratory mission was to learn about the origination of the Hub concept, i.e. how it was initiated, stakeholders and or partners involved, how it is being operated, managed, who was/is part of that process (pre and post establishment) and what was the main aim/objective of its establishment.

The delegation left inspired and perhaps fell in love with Maltahöhe a bit.

Trash is Treasure in Maltahöhe and since we started in October 2024 almost 100.000 empty wine and beer bottles have been collected from the streets for re-use. Collectors are rewarded with cash for every bottle brought. What these modern day hero's are doing isn't just a way to take charge of their own destiny and earn some income to make ends meet (a very practical consideration) it's also sustainability and resilience at its best. Not to mention cultivating a cleaner environment.

















We are excited, happy, honoured and genuinely grateful for two of our institutional partners having committed to support RuralRevive for a second round of funding. The Julius Bär Foundation from Switzerland committed Christmas 2024, and the Capricorn Foundation gave us a solid "yes, count us in - for the longrun" mid 2025. Capricorn's focus will be to co-fund Waste Management / Recycling and Horticulture in its diverse facets, whilst Julius Bär is seed funding (essentially subsidising) the DesertRunner operations for six months until it reaches break even, Horticulture operations in general, comple-tion of 'The Barn' Trading Hub as well as overall project management incl. monitoring and reporting.

Our three year service level agreement with the SSC-DF (Social Security Development Fund) is due for final evaluation and close-out report during July and we are hopeful - once round one is done and dusted and results impress - that the SSC-DF will feel encouraged to come on board for a second round too, likely in the vocational training realm - in the form of bursaries to marginalised people from the Hardap region and beyond.

The Wolwedans Foundation remains committed to match-fund the initiative, with special focus on securing and renovating infrastructures for Waste/Recycling, Horticulture and Vocational Training work packages.

Thank you - from all people involved and benefitting from RuralRevive - to our four key partners. Without your commitment and trust, this wonderful undertaking would not have been possible. The foundation has been laid and it is time to reach out and widen the network, including building a strong customer base to make RR self-sustainable in the long run. Whilst RuralRevive - Building a Desert Based Economy was conceptualised and implemented by the Wolwedans Foundation, the time has come to open the platform to additional players, both drivers of projects as well as additional partners and donors.
